

Start with Art: 2D (and sometimes 3D) classes start with 3-5 minutes of silence and independent drawing. Students are asked to "be with themselves" and make whatever marks on paper they wish.



Middle school students end their class period by updating their <u>Seesaw</u> portfolio.

1 Day Challenge:


Make a non-representational sculpture out of only paper and white glue that uses 3 of the techniques from the poster.




First Day Challenges:


- Make your team into a band.

Team Challenges: Make the tallest tower you can using spaghetti noodles and 1 foot of masking tape. Make the tallest tower you can with only paper.





I use mind maps as short mini lesson activities for students to explore new ideas and as a method for brainstorming.


At the end of class, MS students record on their SeeSaw and work with their team to complete their clean up jobs

Feel free to do anything that doesn't cause a problem for me or someone else.








Curriculum and Assignments: Morgan

Starting in Intermediate, students maintain an inspiration file/creative bank account on their art website.

As their final exam, students present and reflect on their finished art websites to their classmates. Students give the presenting student feedback and discuss their work.

Everything on a 4 point scale:

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4 points / 100% = Accomplished
3.5 points / 85% = Proficient
3 points / 75% = Progressing
2 points / 50% = Attempted
0 points / 0 = Missing
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My Philosophy

- Long Answer
- Grade in a way where students are motivated by their work, not their grade.
- Grade as little as possible.
- Give as much formative feedback as possible. Walk around daily, track progress through student portfolios and Evernote.
- I am very lenient on deadlines and never give zeroes or penalties for late work.

Assessment: Morgan

Students should be able to be successful regardless of their natural talent or abilities: My volleyball experience.

Focus on creativity and thinking in the process, not the product.

Students won't remember the grade they got, but they will remember the feedback you give them.
